STATEMENT OF CHRISTOPHER O'SULLIVAN, BOHERBUE, CO. CORK.

PERIOD: AUGUST 1915 TO MAY 1916.

UNIT: BOHERBUE COMPANY, I.V.

The Boherbue Company of the Irish Volunteers was started at a meeting held in Boherbue on 15th August, 1915. I had attended a meeting in Kanturk and I had invited Denis Lyons, John O'Connell, Jim Manuff and Paddy Tracey to come to a meeting in Boherbue. This was a spontaneous action on my part, taken with a view to getting a Company of Volunteers going here.

We held a preliminary meeting at my forge before the public meeting. There were present - Denis Lyons, John O'Connell, Jim Nunan, Tim Collins, D. Linehan and myself. At this meeting there was just a general discussion, and we arranged for a meeting on the following night to enroll members. At the first meeting about ten men joined up, and by the end of 1915 we had twenty-two in the Company. That remained our strength up to Easter, 1916.

A Committee of five was elected at the start. They were - Christy S'Sullivan, Tim Collins, D. Linehan, J. Mulcahy and J. Daly. All of them were active members of the Company and they organised a concert and dances, and did everything possible to develop the Company and get recruits. They met almost every night. The area covered by the Company was the parish of Boherbue. No supporters of the Irish Party joined the Company, in fact they were hostile.

Daithi Barry came here in the Winter of 1915 to organise and train us. He was sent by Tomás MacCurtain of Cork. He remained in Boherbue for two weeks. He came to us again for some time in the Spring of 1916.

Soon after the formation of the Company the following Officers were elected, and they held office until after Easter, 1916:-

1st Lieutenant:

Christy O'Sullivan.

Adjutant:

Tim Collins.

At the end of 1915 the arms we had were:-

One Snyder rifle.
Seventeen shot guns, with about 500 rounds.
Four pikes.
Three revolvers, with small quantity of ammunition.
One bayonet.

Parades were held three times a week. We had no ex-service-man in the Company and until Daithi Barry came to us we had to do

The usual training was close order the best we could ourselves. drill and route marches. Michael J. Dennehy was sent to the training course in Cork in January, 1916.

The orders for Easter Sunday, 1916, were brought to us by Maturo Sullivadaithi Barry. They were to the effect that the Company was to Should So mobilise with all arms and equipment and three days' rations and Kaulur march to Barley Hill, Newmarket. We had no information as to whom B Actionat the purpose of the parade was. The whole Company mobilised cubraster and all paraded at Boherbue on Easter Sunday morning. The arms we had were:-

One Snyder rifle. Seventeen single-barrel shot guns) with 1,500 rounds of One double-barrel shot gun) ammunition. Three revolvers, with a small quantity of ammunition. Four pikes.

Adjutant.

We marched to Barley Hill and remained there till evening. No orders of any kind came to us there. We marched back to Boherbue and dismissed.

On the following Wednesday a despatch arrived to the effect that all shot gun ammunition possible should be procured. D. Linehan, To Collins abd myself proceeded to Newmarket and Before we left the town the R.I.C. secured 1,000 cartridges. demanded a count of the ammunition in the two shops where we They were on our heels. had bought it. We rushed our horse The Newmarket police wired Boherbue and the driver of But before that we had our car was intercepted and held up. taken the ammunition across the fields and dumped it. driver of the car, Denis Feehan, deserves to be commended. He was severely questioned by the police for hours, but refused to give the names of the men who had been with him. following morning our homes were searched, but nothing was got.

No orders came to us during Easter Week except the despatch about procuring ammunition.

The following arms were surrendered to the police on the following week: - One Snyder rifle, twelve single-barrel shot guns and four pikes. There were no arrests in the Company area.

There were no I.R.B. or Fianna organisations in the district before 1916.
